Maritime economy of Poland

Recent years are marked by a renewed look towards the sea – Poland wants to harness the opportunities given by the Baltic Sea. In November 2015 a separate department is created in the Polish governmental structure – the Ministry of Maritime Economy and Inland Navigation operating in the field of maritime economy, water management, fishery and inland navigation.

The main Polish seaports – Gdańsk, Gdynia and Szczecin-Świnoujście – achieve record-breaking growth in cargo turnover. The first of the abovementioned ports, Gdańsk, is frequented by the biggest container ships in the world associated in transnational alliances: 2M and Ocean Alliance. Świnoujście gives Central Europe large-scale access to Scandinavia, thanks to a well-developed network of ferry connections. Some of the biggest passenger ships in the world visit Gdynia.

In early 2017 Poland ratifies the AGN Agreement which will give way to modernising the network of inland waterways, mostly the Vistula and the Oder. In the future they will become part of the international transport network TEN-T.

Other significant investment projects are planned. Building the Central Port in Gdańsk should bring growth in cargo turnover and attract even more Asian and European partners. Gdańsk is to become the northern gate that brings the European Union and the markets of the Far East together. The value of investment projects

planned for Gdynia until 2021 amounts to approx. 250 million euros. The outside, deep-water port is the flagship project. Building the container terminal in Świnoujście gives West Pomerania the opportunity of attracting the largest logistics operators.

The Szczecin seaport will be able to service ships with larger draft thanks to the deepening of the fairway. The works have already started, just as the process leading to creating a canal across the Vistula Spit – a strategic investment project connecting the Vistula Lagoon with the Gdańsk Bay that will be completed by 2022.

Polish shipyards use top standards and technologies. Almost all kinds of vessels are built in Poland, including innovative, unique ferries with hybrid and electric drives, vessels meant for building marine wind power plants, modern war vessels and other highly specialised ships. They are made in private companies as well as in shipyards associated in the MARS Shipyards&Offshore group. Polish shipyard business today goes beyond huge companies. There are hundreds of smaller innovative producers of commercial vessels, such as regular and luxury catamarans and vachts. Poland is a world leader in this field. Innovative prototypes of underwater hotels are also designed in Poland.

Due to the slightly nostalgic climate, Szczecin does not reveal all its secrets at once, but encourages you to discover them slowly on your own. Its economic success was determined by its strategic location — not far from the Polish-German border, on the Oder River and about 60 km from the Baltic Sea. However, Szczecin is not only about ships and ports, but also about amazing and inspiring space for action.

The capital of West Pomerania is famous for its hospitality and openness. The Chrobry Embankment, a meeting place for sailors from all over the world, is a landmark and a social heart of the city. Together with panoramic terraces of the Oder River, the Pomeranian Dukes' Castle and the harbour, they are a characteristic feature of the picturesque landscape of Szczecin.

Szczecin likes to surprise. An ice lump in the middle of the city? Why not! This is what the edifice of the Szczecin Philharmonic (Mieczysław Karłowicz Philharmonic Hall) brings to mind. In 2015, the philharmonic hall in Szczecin received the Mies van der Rohe Award, the most important award in Europe and one of the most prestigious in the world. A few steps further there are the interactive exhibition pavilions of the Dialogue Centre "Upheavals", which in 2016 won the title World Building of the Year.

Culture and nature live here in harmony, thanks to which Szczecin can boast of exceptionally clean air. The close vicinity of the Beech Forest with the Emerald Lake is an ideal base for excursions into the natural surroundings. Speaking of greenery, it is impossible not to mention Jasne Błonie, a square in the city center, which blooms in the spring with thousands of magnolias.

The unmistakable, unique atmosphere of this city makes Szczecin an ideal place for the weekend and for longer trips.
